### Handling precautions

Be sure to observe the following precautions to ensure that the server functions properly. Ignoring these precautions may cause server malfunction or failure.

#### Installation site

- Install the server in an appropriate place. See Chapter 2 Preparations (2. Installation and Connection).
- Before connecting or removing the cable to or from a peripheral device that does not support the Plug and Play function, make sure that the power to the server is off and remove the power cord from the outlet.
- Switch off all cell phones in the proximity of the server. Electric waves from these devices can cause the server to malfunction.
- Regularly clean the server to prevent failure. See *Chapter 1 Maintenance (2. Daily Maintenance)* in "*Maintenance Guide*" for information about cleaning.
- When storing the server for a long time, be sure to satisfy the storage environment conditions (temperature:

   10 to 55°C, humidity: 20 to 80%, non-condensing).
- Turn off the server and unplug the power cord before moving it.
- In the following cases, check and adjust the system clock before operation.
  - After transportation
  - After storage
  - After the server is used following a period of disuse, in which the storage conditions did not conform to the conditions that guarantee server operations (temperature 10 to 40°C, humidity 20 to 80%)
- Check the system clock approximately once per month. Use of a time server (NTP server) is recommended if highly accurate timing is required by the system.
- The voltage may drop momentarily, for example, due to a lightning strike. To take measures against this, it
  is recommended to use an uninterruptible power supply (UPS).

### **Power supply**

- Be sure to use this server within the rated current and voltage.
- Power supply cord is not provided as a standard accessory with this server. Be sure to use power supply
  cord specified by our company based on the power supply voltage and current depending on the
  environment for use.
- An uninterruptible power supply (UPS) is used to prevent momentary voltage drops.
   The server does not support UPS connection through the serial port (RS-232C) or power control by PowerChute Plus.

### Power-on/Power-off

- Do not turn on the server after connecting the power cord to the outlet before the Module POWER LED on the front of the device (see *Chapter 1 (4.8 LEDs)*) blinks in green (90 seconds).
- If an uninterruptible power supply (UPS) is connected, set the schedule to wait for at least 90 seconds before turning on the server.
- Do not power off or reset the server, nor disconnect the power cord before POST completes.
- Make sure that the DISK ACCESS LED or Optical DISK ACCESS LED is off before turning off the power or
  ejecting media from a hard disk drive or an optical disk.
- Allow 30 seconds or more to elapse when turning ON the power of the unit again after turning it to OFF.
- When disconnecting power cord from the outlet, wait at least 30 seconds before connecting the power cord again.
- For stable operation, it is recommended to restart the OS after the system has been duplexed.

- When the power is supplied to both CPU/IO modules at about the same time, 'CPU/IO module 0' is
  recognized as a primary module. In order for 'CPU/IO module 1' to be recognized as a primary module,
  connect the power cord to CPU/IO module 1 first, wait for a certain amount of time (15 seconds at least),
  and then connect the power cord to CPU/IO module 0.
- If a UPS is connected and you want to make CPU/IO module 1 recognized as a primary module, set the schedule so that the power will be supplied to CPU/IO module 1 first, and then CPU/IO module 0, at least 15 seconds later.
- When you power off the server, "Power ON" may be displayed on the following screen of NEC ESMPRO Manager.
  - [Remote Control]tab [Remote Power Control] [System Power Status]
  - [optional group] [Server Control]tab [Remote Power Control] [Power Status]
  - [Constitution]tab [Server Status] [Common Information] [System Power Status]

Therefore, when checking whether this server is powered off, please check that both CPU/IO modules of the following are "Power OFF".

#### **Optional devices**

- We do not guarantee reproduction of copy-protected DVDs and CDs using reproduction equipment if such disks do not comply with the relevant standards.
- If this server, internal optional devices, and media used as backup devices (tape cartridges) are moved from a cold place to a warm place in a short period of time, condensation may occur, causing malfunction or failure when these devices are next used. To protect important stored data and assets, make sure to wait for a sufficient period before using the server and components in the operating environment.

Reference: Time effective for avoiding condensation in winter (more than 10°C difference between the room temperature and atmospheric temperature)

Disk devices: Approximately 2 to 3 hours

Tape media: Approximately 1 day

 For optional devices, we recommend you use NEC products. Even if they are successfully installed or connected, installation of unsupported devices can cause the server to malfunction or fail. You will be charged to repair failures or damage caused by the use of such products even if it is within the warranty period.

### Tips for your health and safety

Using a computer extensively may affect different parts of your body. Here are tips you should follow while working on a computer to minimize strain on your body.

#### Keep proper posture



# 1. Preface

Welcome to the NEC Express5800 Series product.

This server is a "fault-tolerant (ft)" server focusing on "high reliability" in terms of fault-tolerance, in addition to "high performance", "scalability", and "general versatility" provided by Express5800 series.

In the event of trouble, its dual configuration will allow the system to instantaneously isolate the failed parts to assure non-stop running; operation will be moved smoothly from one module to the other, minimizing damage to it. You can use this server in a mission-critical system where high availability is required. By the use of Windows operating system or VMware ESXi, it also provides outstanding openness for general-purpose applications, etc.

To make the best use of these features, read this User's Guide thoroughly to understand how to operate the server.


### 3.2 Fault-Tolerant Features

Hardware modules work while synchronizing and comparing with each other. Even if one hardware module stops, the server can continue its operation as the service with the other hardware module.

#### Major components are duplexed:

Even if one hardware module stops, the server can continue operation with the other module.

After the failed module is replaced, the new module obtains information from the other and resumes operation.



This server is a highly fault-tolerant server that achieves continuous computing operations, data storage mirror, and continuous network connection. This server is capable of executing applications running on Windows operating system or a guest operating system supported by VMware ESXi.

This server achieves continuous computing operations for the server and server-based applications with its redundant CPU processing and redundant memory. It assures data redundancy through duplication of server data on an independent storage system. These features eliminate server downtime that is usually caused by network disconnection or trouble with the I/O controller, network adapter or hard disk drive, and support operation of the network and server applications continuously.

This server detects status changes, errors and logs of these events. If you use an alarm notification tool, you can configure this server to notify you when certain events occur.

This server is installed on the system as a server management solution. NEC ESMPRO, a GUI-based management tool, allows you to monitor, view, and configure the server. This tool also supports both local and remote management of the server.

#### (a) Advantages of this server

• Highly fault-tolerant processing and I/O subsystems

This server uses redundant hardware and software to assure server operation even if one module suffers trouble with its processor, memory, I/O (including trouble related to the I/O controller), hard disk drive, or network adapter.

#### Continuous network connection

This server maintains continuous network connection by detecting any trouble with the network adapter, connection, etc. If trouble occurs, the standby network connection will take over all network traffic processing and thus securely maintain the network system connection of the server without losing network traffic or client connection.

### · Support of multiple network connections

Since this server can support multiple network connections, you can add network redundant control or network traffic control.

#### · No need to modify applications

You can run the each OS-compliant application on this server. Thus, unlike other highly fault-tolerant products, special API or scripts are not necessary.

### · Automatic mirroring

This server automatically maintains data as the current data.

#### • Transparent migration

This server constantly monitors events. If trouble occurs on server module of this server, it will transparently use a redundant module of the failed module. This feature maintains data and user access without stopping application service.

### · Automatic reconfiguration

When the failed module restarts after the trouble is corrected, the server will perform reconfiguration automatically, and if necessary, resynchronize the affected modules. Reconfiguration can include CPU processing (e.g., CPU memory), server's operating system (and related applications), and system data stored on the hard disk drive. In most cases, the server automatically restores redundancy of the server modules after recovery.

#### • Event notification function (Windows)

When trouble or other events are detected on the server, they will be notified to Log and saved. Therefore, you can view the log items locally or remotely by a usual OS operation. Since an events use unique IDs, they are easy to distinguish. In addition, you can use alert notification software such as Express Report Service or Express Report Service (HTTPS) to manage the server. It is recommended to use such software to cope with system failure quickly. Ask your service representative for details.

### • syslog function (VMware)

All events and failures detected by the server are saved in syslog. In addition, you can use alarm report software, such as Express Report Service, for management of this server. It is recommended that Express Report Service be used also to cope with system failures quickly. Ask your sales representative for details.

### In-service repairing

You can repair or replace a failed module even if the server is operating.

*NEC ESMPRO Agent* enables you to collectively manage the state of your systems. You can also monitor the server states from a management PC on network where *NEC ESMPRO Manager* is installed.









4. Open the acrylic cover, and press the POWER switch.



The System POWER LED goes on green, the server starts.

When the server starts, the server runs a power-on self test (POST) to check hardware. For details, see *Chapter 3 (1.1 POST)*.

After a while, the logo will appear on the screen.

Important

- Do not connect or disconnect USB device while POST is running.
- Do not power off the server while POST is running.

Chapter 3 Setup 1. Turning on the Server

#### 1.1 **POST**

Power-On Self Test (POST) is a self-test feature stored on the motherboard of the server. When you power on the server, POST will start automatically to check the CPU/IO board, DIMM, processor (CPU), and other devices. POST also displays startup messages for various utilities.

Usually, you do not need to check the POST message, but you should check messages when:

- You install a new server.
- You suspect a failure.
- An error message appears.

### 1.1.1 POST process

1. When you power on the server, it starts from the primary CPU/IO module. Then, POST begins, and messages are displayed on the display to notify of initialization of the memory, PCI device, and so on. After the initialization messages, the logo appears on the display.

Note

- Keyboard becomes operable after the logo appears.
- While the initialization messages are appearing, they may disappear on the screen (black screen) a moment but there is no problem.
- Depending on the setting of BIOS setup utility (SETUP), the logo or initialization message does not appear.

If Enabled is specified for Password On Boot in Security menu of SETUP, you will be prompted to enter password after the logo is displayed. If you enter the incorrect password three times consecutively, POST is stopped. In this case, power off the server, and power it on.

Important Do not set a password before installing an OS.

2. Press the Esc key to clear the log. Then, the contents of POST are displayed. It includes messages to notify of the installed CPU, the memory capacity, and others.

**Tips** 

If you set "Quiet Boot" to [Disabled] in the "Boot" menu in the BIOS setup utility (SETUP), the contents of logo will be shown without the logo itself.

3. After a while, the following message appears on the screen. (\* The on-screen message depends on your system environment.)

```
Press <F2> SETUP, <F4> ROM Utility, <F12> Network
```

You can run the various functions by pressing the following function key:

- <F2> key: Runs BIOS Setup Utility (SETUP). For details, see Chapter 3 (2. BIOS Setup Utility (SETUP)) on this guide.
- Runs Offline Tools. For details, see Chapter 1 (12. Offline Tools) in Maintenance Guide (Windows) or Chapter 1 (11. Offline Tools) in Maintenance Guide (VMware).
- <F12> key: Starts from network.
- 4. The OS starts when POST is completed.

### 1.1.2 POST Error Messages

If POST detects an error, an error message appears on the screen. For descriptions of error messages, causes, and countermeasures, see *Chapter 1 (6.2. POST Error Message)* in *Maintenance Guide*.

### 1.1.3 Switching of boot pair

The CPU/IO module 0 or 1 is started depending on the primary/secondary status of modules when the server was shut down the last time. At the first startup after AC OFF, the CPU/IO module (0 or 1) powered on first is managed as primary, and the module powered on later is managed as secondary.

If POST or OS startup does not complete normally, the server will automatically restart. In this case, the other CPU/IO module (secondary) is determined as primary module, and POST or OS runs on that module (switching of boot pair).

If POST does not complete normally on both CPU/IO modules, the server will stop with the state of DC OFF or POST halts with an error message displayed.

The following devices are connected to the primary CPU/IO module. When one CPU/IO module is disconnected because of a failure, the other module is selected automatically to continue operating.

- VGA (display)
- USB device (keyboard, mouse, server switch unit, Flash FDD, optical disk drive)

Note

- If the Flash FDD is connected to a Windows model, the drive letter may change from A
  to B by switching CPU/IO modules. Changing of the drive letter does not affect the
  operation of the server. If the drive letter is changed, access the Flash FDD with the
  changed drive letter.
- For Windows models, the drive letter of the optical disk drive is re-assigned automatically. The unused letter is assigned to the drive in the order of D to Z. If you want to set the fixed drive letter to the optical disk drive, specify the letter which is not assigned in the order of D to Z after setting the hard disk drive letter.

# 2. BIOS Setup Utility (SETUP)

This section describes how to configure basic input/output system (BIOS). Make sure that you understand the descriptions in this chapter to configure BIOS properly.

### 2.1 Overview

BIOS Setup Utility (SETUP) is a utility to set basic hardware settings. This utility is installed in a flash memory on the server as standard.

Factory settings of BIOS are set with optimal values. Usually, you do not need to run SETUP. <u>Modify the settings only at the cases described in *Chapter 3 (2.4 Cases that Require Changes)*.</u>

## **2.2** Starting and Exiting SETUP

### 2.2.1 Starting SETUP

Run POST following Chapter 3 (1.1.1 POST process).

After a while, the following message will be displayed on the lower left of the screen. The on-screen message depends on your system environment.

Press <F2> SETUP, <F4> ROM Utility, <F12> Network

If you press <F2> key, SETUP starts upon completion of POST, and the Main menu appears .

If you have set a password, the following message appears and prompts you to enter the password.

Enter Password [

If you enter incorrect password consecutively three times, the operation stops and you cannot proceed. No more operations can be done. Turn off the power.

### 2.2.2 Exiting SETUP

To exit SETUP after saving changes, choose Save & Exit  $\rightarrow$  Save Changes and Exit.



# 3. EXPRESSSCOPE Engine 3

### 3.1 Overview

EXPRESSSCOPE Engine 3 provides a variety of features using Baseboard Management Controller (BMC).

For details, see EXPRESSSCOPE Engine 3 User's Guide in EXPRESSBUILDER.

EXPRESSSCOPE Engine 3 monitors the power unit, fans, temperature, and voltage of the server. Connecting the management LAN connector (see *Chapter 1 (4.3 Rear View)*) to your network enables you to do the following from a remote site through a web browser and SSH client:

- · Manage the server
- · Remotely control the keyboard, video, and mouse (KVM)
- Remotely access a CD/DVD/floppy disk/ISO image/USB memory(\*).
- \* To actualize these functions, virtual USB mass storage (Remote FD, Remote CD/DVD, Remote USB Memory, or Virtual Flash) is always connected as USB mass storage.

**Tips** 

Use Offline Tools of the server to reset BMC.

See Chapter 3 (2. BMC Configuration) in "Maintenance Guide" for more information.

Note

EXPRESSSCOPE Engine 3 is implemented on both CPU/IO modules (module 0 and 1) and configuration is required on both modules. (Namely, different IP addresses for CPU/IO module 0 and 1 need to be set.)

#### **3.2** EXPRESSSCOPE ENGINE 3 Network configuration

Below is an example of the configuration procedure which enables EXPRESSSCOPE Engine 3 to be used via a web browser.

1. Run POST according to *Chapter 3 (1.1.1 POST process)*. After a while, the following message appears on the lower left of the screen. (\* The on-screen message depends on your system environment.)

```
Press <F2> SETUP, <F4> ROM Utility, <F12> Network
```

- 2. Press the <F4> key to launch Off-line TOOL while the message is displayed.
- 3. Select your keyboard type on keyboard selection screen.
- 4. When the Off-line TOOL MENU appears, select **BMC Configuration**, **BMC Configuration**, **Network**: **CPU/IO module 0/1**, and then **IPv4 Property** or **IPv6 Property**.



5. Configure IPv4 or IPv6 network settings.




Figure of IPv4 Property




Figure of IPv6 Property

6. Connect the LAN cable to the management LAN connector in order to connect to the network.

EXPRESSBUILDER helps you to install Windows or maintain the server.

#### 4.1 Features of EXPRESSBUILDER

EXPRESSBUILDER provides the following features.

Feature	Description
Setup (Windows reinstallation)	Installs Windows on your server. Easily completes the process to installation of applications. To use this feature, choose <b>OS installation</b> in Boot Selection Menu.
Bundled software	Stores NEC ESMPRO, BMC Configuration, and other bundled software.
Maintenance	Diagnoses the server. To use this feature, choose <b>Tool menu</b> in Boot Selection Menu.
Manuals	Stores manuals, including this User's Guide.

### **4.2** Usage of EXPRESSBUILDER

To install the Windows OS or diagnose the system, you can use EXPRESSBUILDER, which comes with the server.

Start EXPRESSBUILDER in either of the following procedure.

- Insert the DVD into the server, and then restart it.
- Insert the DVD into a computer running Windows. Autorun menu appears automatically. If the menu does not appear automatically, run the following file.

\autorun\dispatcher\_x64.exe.

For details, see Chapter 3 (5. Details of EXPRESSBUILDER) in Maintenance Guide.

Follow the steps below to turn off the power. If the server is connected to a UPS, refer to manuals provided with the UPS or the application that controls the UPS.

- 1. Shut down the OS.
- The server automatically turns off after the OS shuts down.The Module POWER LED on each CPU/IO module will be blinking while AC power is supplied.
- 3. Power off all peripheral devices.

**Tips** 

Hibernate feature of Windows Server cannot be used. Do not set Hibernate at Windows shutdown.

BMC	Baseboard Management Controller (BMC) is a built-in controller that supports the IPMI version 2.0 protocol. BMC can manage the server hardware.	
BMC Configuration Utility	Software for setting BIOS and BMC. You can use as Windows application or run this software when pressing <f4> key during POST.</f4>	
CPU/IO module	A module that includes CPUs (processors), memory, PCI boards, a cooling fan, hard disk drives and power supply units.	
DUMP Switch	A switch that is used for collecting the memory dump if an error occurs. You can specify the destination of the dump by using the OS function.	
EXPRESSBUILDER	Standard software with a feature that makes it easier to install Windows OS in Windows model. This also includes several useful applications and instruction manuals. (Wher installing OS other than Windows in ft server, the feature that helps easy OS installation is not available.)	
EXPRESSSCOPE ENGINE 3	A name of BMC for NEC Express5800 series.	
Express Report Service	Software that can report the server failure to the contact center by E-mail or modem. This software is installed with NEC ESMPRO Agent to the server.
